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Introduction







The **Scottish COVID-19 Inquiry** is a team of people who are finding out what happened during the COVID-19 pandemic in Scotland.

An **inquiry** is a review into what went well and what could have been done better.

Since the winter newsletter the Inquiry team has been busy:

• continuing investigations

An **investigation** is when a person or organisation looks for facts, figures and information to find out exactly what happened.



- starting the Let's Be Heard listening project
- telling core participants how well work is going





A person or organisation must apply to the Chair of the Inquiry to become a **core participant**.

A core participant has a special interest in something the Inquiry is investigating.



Stuart Gale **KC**, one of our Senior **Counsel**, has met:

- people whose loved ones have died from COVID-19
- people who had relatives in care homes in the pandemic

A counsel is a lawyer.

KC means **King's Counsel** – a very senior, experienced lawyer.

He talked with them about:

- the start of our listening project called Let's Be Heard
- plans for our first health and social care impact hearings, which will be in the autumn

A hearing is an important meeting.

A team of Inquiry **researchers** will look at the responses we get and use them to help our investigations and reports.

Researchers are people who look closely at facts, figures and information.

Hearings




The Scottish COVID-19 Inquiry has 3 investigation areas:

- health and social care
- education and young people
- finance, business and welfare









- the effect of the pandemic
- how things were put in place to keep us safe
- how important decisions were made

The things the Inquiry is looking at are called the <u>Terms of Reference</u>.

More information about what will be covered under each area will be available as investigations continue.

We want to make sure that the experiences of people across Scotland are an important part of our investigations.

We want to find out what effect the pandemic had on people before people start to forget.



Before the hearings happen, the Inquiry will have a presentation in the summer about COVID-19 to give background information to support future investigations and hearings.

Core participant applications









In March 2023, the Scottish COVID-19 Inquiry opened its applications to be a core participant again.

The Inquiry was interested in getting applications from people and organisations interested in the health and social care area.

Lord Brailsford, Chair to the Inquiry looked at all the applications.

People and organisations that were successful were invited to take part in an online planning meeting with:

- other core participants in the health and social care investigation area
- the Chair and senior legal team

The core participant and funding application process will open again later this year.

We would like applications from people and organisations based in Scotland, that are interested in the Inquiry's work about:

- education and young people
- business and welfare







Let's Be Heard


Let's COVID-19 INQUIRY Heard People and organisations that are core participants have some extra rights including:

- making statements when the Inquiry holds public hearings, unless the Chair says this cannot happen
- suggesting questions for Counsel to the Inquiry to ask witnesses
- asking questions of witnesses at a public hearing, if the Chair says this can happen
- getting early copies of the Inquiry's reports

Let's Be Heard is a way for everyone in Scotland to:

- share their experiences of the COVID-19 pandemic in Scotland
- tell us how it affected them







 tell us what should have been done differently so that Scotland is better prepared in future



- The 3 questions that are being asked are:
- 1. What were your experiences of the COVID-19 pandemic?



2. What impact did these experiences have on you or people you know?



3. What lessons do you think should be learned from your experiences?











A team of Inquiry researchers and **analysts** will look at the responses we get through Let's Be Heard and use them to help our investigations and reports.

Analysts check information very carefully to understand it better.

The team will find out if COVID-19 affected any groups or communities more than others.

People can also share their experiences by getting a paper form, filling it in and returning it to our **Freepost** address.

Freepost means you do not have to put a stamp on the envelope.



Paper forms are in public places across Scotland including:

- GP practices
- care homes
- community pharmacies
- public libraries
- community centres
